Woman Suffrage Centennial Forums scheduled in five Arizona communities during 2012! First one in Prescott, March 9 Next Phoenix, March 23!

AWHT has scheduled five forums in Arizona in celebration of the woman suffrage centennial in 2012 also! After years of struggle, Arizona won the right to vote in 2012, shortly after Arizona gained statehood on February 14, 2012. In the fall of 1912, an initiative was introduced in the House Chamber, for woman suffrage.

With a substantial victory, women's voting privileges were granted by the voters on November 05, 1912. Success had been obtained, through dedication, commitment, strategic political planning and execution, and many hours of hard work and travel throughout the state. The forums will consist of a short play highlighting some of the suffragist leaders, and outlining the pro and con arguments that were expressed loud and clear during the entire suffrage movement. There will be ample time for questions and discussion following the play presentation. Audience participation will be encouraged.
